Lambert Will Stand Trial Here

Refuses To Ask Venue Change

Lambert, Kattenthorpe, chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, has indicated in a statement to the County Board of Supervisors that he will stand trial here for the charges of bribery.

As the deadline for filing a charge of venue moves into the stage of venue moves was reached yesterday, Kattenthorpe said he has instructed his attorney not to file one.

"I have done as venue, and I want to be sentenced in the county where the voters have many times said it is better by voting me to public office," he said.

Kattenthorpe is scheduled to stand trial May 2. Since his indictment by a grand jury in March, 1958, three other charges—two of bribery and one of false statements—have been dropped.

The supervisor is completing his two-year term in office and recently announced his intention to go on to the re-election this fall.

Following is the statement Kattenthorpe issued last week:

"There has been some speculation as to whether or not I will request a change of venue in connection with the charges against me in Pima County Superior Court. I have arranged my attorney not to make any motion for a change of venue.

"I have lived in Pima County for over 20 years. My children were reared in Tucson and now live in Arizona, and my grand children are being reared in Pima County.

"I have served as a member of the Board of Supervisors of Pima County for a period of 12 years, which constitutes seven consecutive terms, and I therefore feel that I should be tried in Pima County.

"At this point he stated that he had gone to court and would be vindicated in this case.

"I feel strong that jury members from residence of Pima County will give me a fair and impartial trial," he concluded.
