

Ruling In UA Suit Delayed

Judgment in the civil rights suit against five University of Arizona administrators may not be made until May or June, according to one of the lawyers for the plaintiffs.

W. Edward Morgan, representing seven Vietnam war protestors suing the officials over the banning of a 1968 memorial service from campus, said the filing of briefs by both sides and final oral arguments probably would not be completed until May and that a decision by Judge William J. Lindberg probably would be made in June.

Testimony was completed yesterday, after five days of hearings on the question, and Lindberg took the matter under advisement.

The protest, a "Vietnam Commencement," was banned from campus buildings and later a Superior Court restraining order was issued to prevent the participants from entering the campus main gates.

Plaintiffs in the suit, each seeking \$30,000 from the administrators, are UA professors Dr. Robert W. Bretall and Dr. Paul Martin, UCLA professor Dr. Donald Kalish and students Mitchell Axler, Ronald London and Betsy McDonald. Mrs. McDonald is the wife of UA physicist Dr. James McDonald.

Defendants are UA president Dr. Richard A. Harvill, vice presidents Marvin D. Johnson and Robert L. Houston, Campus Security Chief Douglas Paxton and Regents' adviser Thomas L. Hall.
