

UA SUIT

Judge Will Receive Barred Testimony

Visiting U.S. District Court Judge William J. Lindberg ruled today he will hear formerly disallowed testimony because of its possible importance in deciding a suit brought against five University of Arizona administrators.

Lindberg, of Seattle, told attorneys for both the administrators and for suing members of the UA Student Peace Association he would allow the testimony of attorney William Kimble, even though he ruled it inadmissible March 20.

The judge said he either would hear testimony or accept a deposition, whichever was acceptable to both sides.

The suit is against UA President Dr. Richard A. Harvill,

Vice presidents Marvin D. Johnson and Robert Houston, UA security chief Douglas Paxton and Board of Regents legal adviser Thomas L. Hall. The lawsuit grew out of the university's getting a Superior Court restraining order against a May 1967 protest convocation, planned on campus and later held in a city park.

Plaintiffs are Mitchell Axler, Mrs. Betsy McDonald, Richard A. Handverger, Ronald London, Dr. Robert W. Bretall, Dr. Paul Martin and Dr. Donald Kallish. They seek \$30,000 each in damages.

Kimble's statements previously were disallowed because he was not listed as a witness in a pretrial memorandum.
