

'Good Neighbors' gain ballot spots

Three Tucson candidates of the newly formed Good Neighbors Union (GNU) have qualified by petition for a place on the Nov. 7 general election ballot.

Asst. Secretary of State Rose Mofford said the GNU candidates are Carolyn Meinel Henson, Mary Janet "Jinx" Damon and Johnny W. Bowens.

Mrs. Henson is running for the Arizona Senate from District 12. She will oppose incumbent Republican Sen. Douglas Holsclaw, who has no Democratic challenger.

Court OKs way lawyer handles taxes

Tucson attorney Richard E. Bailey is in compliance with State Employment Security Commission regulations regarding withholding taxes for employes for unemployment compensation.

A commission auditor said Bailey appeared before the commission yesterday at 407 W. Congress St. and was found to be in compliance with applicable laws.

Bailey had been directed by Superior Court Judge Alice Truman to appear before the commission with wage records for his employes covering a 39-month period ending March 31, 1972, after a former worker for the lawyer filed for unemployment compensation.

Mrs. Damon seeks a House seat from District 12, where incumbent GOP Rep. J. Peter Hershberger, former GOP Rep. Thomas N. Goodwin and Democrats Martin Bedford and James J. Wagner have been nominated for two positions.

Bowens is running for a House seat from District 11, where the major parties' candidates are incumbent Democratic Rep. Robert P. Fricks, Democrat Emilio Carrillo and Republicans Alfred S. "Skip" Donau and James R. Madson.

The three legislative candidates had hoped to campaign under the New Party banner, but were denied that opportunity when New Party petitions were invalidated by county recorders. Then they joined forces as GNU members with similar views but without party affiliation.

Paul Damon, Tucson chairman of the New Party, said the trio's decision was prompted by the prospect that a final legal ruling — even if favorable — on the validity of his party's petitions would not be made in time for proper campaigning.

Mrs. Mofford also announced in Phoenix that six Tucson presidential-elect candidate of the Socialist Workers Party submitted more than enough petition signatures to win places on the November ballot. They are Timothy J. Clennon, Albert J. Dannells, Betsy Ann McDonald, Bradley Wells Tracy, Lois M. Turner and Eleanor Voris Weinzapfel.
