McDonald's Speaking Tour To Affirm Belief In UFOs

Dr. James E. McDonald, senior physicist in the University of Arizona's Institute of Atmospheric Physics, will speak on unidentified flying objects (UFOs) next Friday at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

McDonald's talk on "UFO's and the Condon Report: A Dissenting View" will be given at a meeting of the Vandenberg Chapter of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA). It is one of 15 lectures he is presenting at AIAA section meetings during 1968-69.

He believes that the recent Condon report is not a high-caliber scientific study. He will point out that the report, based on 90 UFO cases, deals with only a "minute fraction" of the significant cases available for study.

McDonald's criticism of the report and Air Force explanations of the UFOs is based on his study of UFOs over several years. His opinion is that UFOs are real — and probably

extraterrestrial — surveillance crafts. He believes the Condon report is "not the definitive, exhaustive study it is being made out to be."

McDonald will speak next month at AIAA sections in California, Iowa, Arizona, Washington, D.C. Pennsylvania, Oklahoma, Missouri and Minnesota.

Actress Malone, Gothamite Wed

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Actress Dorothy Malone married a New York businessman, Robert Tomarkin, Thursday at a Las Vegas wedding chapel.
