State Academy Of Science Holding Meeting Here

The Arizona Academy of Science held its fourth annual statewide meeting here today.

Approximately 150 Arizonans interested in science were attending the one-day meeting at the University of Arizona.

The Arizona - Sonora Desert Museum sponsored the conference along with the university. And registration took place this morning at the museum in the Tucson Mountains.

The main events of the day were the presenting of papers telling of the research results and the granting of awards.

At a luncheon in the Student Union building, Dr. James E. McDonald received the Savings Bond award for his paper "Predicting Results of H-Bomb Nu-

clear Explosions over Tucson and Phoenix."

Certificates of merit were given to three teachers—George Bazetta of Tucson High School, Frank Gilleland of North High, Phoenix; and Charles McCormick of Flagstaff High.

The main speaker at the luncheon was John I. Yellott, of Phoenix, retiring president.

William H. Woodin III, director of the Desert Museum, is president-elect of the organization which has 425 members and 200 others in a Junior Academy.

Dr. A. Richard Kassander, head of the UA Institute of Atmospheric Physics, was to talk on cloud physics for the junior group.

The academy has the general purpose of stimulating scientific research and education in Arizona.

The meeting was to be divided into sections this afternoon when papers would be given and discussion held in anthropology, biology, geography, geology and physics-astronomy.
